## Analysis of affordability of 'London Living Rents' for households with median income levels based on a third of income being used for rent.

- London Tenants Federation's (LTF) recent analysis on the London Mayor's London
  Living Rents reveals this 'affordable housing' product to be unaffordable to the vast
  majority of households with equivalised median incomes in most London wards.
  Clearly even fewer would be affordable to those with less than the mid-point of
  income levels.
- The analysis has been carried out as LTF is increasingly concerned that the London Mayor's 'affordable housing' products (with the exception of social rented homes) are just not unaffordable to below the median income households.
- Its analysis compares a third of the London equivalised<sup>1</sup> median income level with the 2018/19 benchmark London Living Rents for each London ward (which can be found on the GLA website) at different bedroom sizes.
- This shows London Living Rents to be affordable in only 147(23%) of London's 632 wards for a one-bedroom home, 62 (10%) wards for a two-bedroom, 14 (2%) wards for a three bedroom and just four wards (0.6%) for a four-bedroom home (see table on page 2 and full excel sheet attached)
- Only five inner London boroughs have any wards where homes at London Living Rents are affordable at equivalised median income levels (based on rents being a third of income). London Living Rent is unaffordable in all wards in ten boroughs - Bromley, Camden, Hammersmith & Fulham, Islington, Kensington & Chelsea, Kingston, Richmond Upon Thames, Tower Hamlets, Wandsworth and Westminster and the City of London.
- Equivalisation<sup>2</sup> is a standard methodology that adjusts household income to account for the different financial resource requirements of different household sizes used by bodies like the Office of National Statistics. The equivalised median income in London is just £536 a week or £2,322.66 pcm. A third of this monthly income is £774.14.
- Sadiq Khan deemed London Living Rents to be 'genuinely affordable' to 'middle income' income households. The GLA website says the rents are based on one third of median incomes for each ward in London, but on gross incomes.
- LTF highlights that in addition, there is an expectation that households accessing London Living Rent homes will also put some money away to later buy a home. They would have the right to buy the home they are renting via shared ownership. It's not clear how much they would be expected to save while renting but clearly this is an added cost that a household would need to consider.
- We have not definition of what 'median incomes' are supposed to be but clearly they do not include households with incomes in the exact middle. Presumably the bar on this and government subsidy is increasingly being focused on households with increasingly higher incomes.
